#### II. STATUS UPDATE

Water/Sewer Capacity Report

- -presentation provided by Director Houser
- -Question TT: for large developments greater than 180 days in progress, could you provide more information?
- -information provided by Director Houser
- -Question LCJ: I see the map showed here is at DeKalb GIS website. This hasn't been placed on the county website yet has it?
- M Houser: not yet we wanted to show this to the commissioners first
- -Question LCJ: is there a link to this included anywhere?
- M Houser: no because you need a password to login; however when the GIS team rolls it out it will be accessible and users will be able to toggle through
- -Question LCJ: 60% of stormwater is owned and controlled by the county, but the other 40% is controlled by the people of DeKalb. This tool will inform individuals who is responsible for the stormwater. I love the map and can't wait to be more engaged with the map

#### III. DISCUSSION

Public/Private Sewers

-presentation provided by Director Houser on managing private stormwater in the public sewers

-Question TT: regarding the legacy systems, does that mean the government put in combined systems or the private entities allowed to place combined systems?

M Houser: it may not have been a planned approach when you look back at history. There was not a sewage treatment plant across the metro area. There's a lot of history there so that's the reason why we say some of the legacy systems. But we know there should be separate systems.

-M Houser: we will be coming back to the board regarding certain incentives we want to roll out

-Question TT: is it mostly the residential laterals that are that 50% or is it commercial, university, etc.?

M Houser: we don't have that information but can get it to you. I will see if our GIS team can help us figure out that

-Question TT: in residential areas, are we finding that developers may have built a subdivision; who did the pipes from the stormwater to the sewer system?

M Houser: many communities have been here for decades; it some cases it was easier to connect the pipes; we have some legacy issues

-Question LCJ: regarding the smoke tests, as we are finding these issues, are the bulk of issues private?

M Houser: yes - when we do smoke testing we are looking at private issues

-Question TT: you list goal to release 25 millions of gallons per day. Regarding these 8500 defects identified, what percentage of that 25 million is coming from these private defects, and what percentage is coming from the roots?

M Houser: that 25 million is the public side, not the private side. Additional information provided by Director Houser

-Question TT: on a single family home built 80 years ago, they may have a gutter or downspout going into a some drain that dumps into the sewer lateral from the house. Could you discuss the distinguishing between a private home and a development that may be involved in that system?

-response provided by Director Houser

-Question JR: regarding the county financing and repairs, where are we in the process of getting that rolled out?

COO Williams: we're finalizing one of the programs regarding Care and Concern; I'm anticipating that being signed in the next 7 days, and that could help get people connected. That is called Project Nehemiah

-JR: please send me more information on that

-Question TT: regarding the financing for the low income assistance - in the energy sector there is a pay-as-you-save concept for homeowners to be attached to the meter, regardless of who lives there. I also wonder if our stormwater fee assessment may come into play here - does that equation change if the stormwater is now going into the wrong pipe? Can a stormwater fee consider a different formula to take issues like this into consideration? Is the policy for us to expedite as quickly as possible, or is it about what we can afford? Does it make sense to increase the credit system?

-Question TT: are there any projections from agencies on the wet cycle/dry cycle?

M Houser: we will reach out; we understand the environment will become more extreme with climate change; I will make a note of that

-Question JR: how can I direct ratepayers to apply for a credit for casual irrigation?

Z Williams: let me get an update on where that is an provide that at the next meeting

-Question JR: what do we need to do at watershed to make us ready to issue Watershed new public debt?

Z Williams: other than getting the finance advisory team I don't know if there are other considerations.

-Question JR: how far have we run through the 70 million that we borrowed against tax funds?

Z Williams: around \$40 million

I wonder in a future contract we can fold in bio remediation so that we don't have to come in a mow every year? Williams: let me go back and take a look at that. We can see what others are doing regarding that

-Question TT: can we pilot with a couple of ponds?
