APPROVAL OF AGENDA

Chair Lowman Smith called the meeting to order at 1:30 p.m. Ms. Austin read the roll by calling each board member by name. All members except Mr. Lewis were in attendance. Mr. Lewis joined later in the meeting.

Motion by Vice-Chair Jester, seconded by Ms. Motter, to approve the agenda with the addition of an executive session for purposes of litigation. The motion carried unanimously.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Ms. Austin read the rules for public comment:

ITEMS FOR DECISION

A) Konnech (Poll Chief)

Director Smith reminded listeners that last month, the department had entered into an agreement with Konnech Corporation as part of an effort to modernize its poll worker, asset, and learning management capabilities. The agreement had required that all data be housed in the United States and that all poll worker data be used only for its intended purpose. The Director announced that on October 4, the department had learned of allegations made against Konnech and asked the Board to decide on the matter.

Ms. Swift asked where the data would be stored. Mr. Matelski responded that any vendor's data would be stored in DeKalb County's Azure tenant where the IT Department could control access to it.

Ms. Swift asked what information had already been shared with Konnech. Director Smith responded that to date only publicly available information such as addresses and phone numbers had been shared.

Chair Lowman Smith noted that as soon as the allegations surfaced, further entry of data had ceased until it could be stored as Mr. Matelski had described.

Vice-Chair Jester asked if identity protection for poll workers had been considered. The Chair responded that it had not been discussed because no private information had been shared to date.

The Vice Chair asked Mr. Matelski if this arrangement would be similar to relationships with existing vendors. Mr. Matelski responded that it was similar to other arrangements the county had made. In some cases data was stored on the county's servers and in other cases it was stored by the vendor.

The Vice Chair asked how the county knew that its data was safe when it was stored by other vendors. Mr. Matelski responded the IT Department worked with the vendors to receive reports and logs.

Chair Lowman Smith asked Director Smith to reconfirm that the Poll Chief system had no relationship to the voting equipment. The Director responded that it did not connect to the voting equipment in any way.

Motion by Vice-Chair Jester, seconded by Mr. Lewis, to terminate Konnech's contract in its entirety.

The motion failed by a vote of 2-3. Vice-Chair Jester and Mr. Lewis voted aye. Chair Lowman Smith, Ms. Motter, and Ms. Swift voted nay.

Motion by Ms. Motter to approve an amendment to the Poll Chief license, maintenance, and support agreement between the Board and Konnech, in such form that the county attorneys may recommend, to reflect that the DeKalb County poll worker data so referenced in such agreement will be maintained by a server of DeKalb County, with the security, particulars, and protocols as discussed in this meeting, that no data shall be maintained by Konnech on any of its servers, and that the Executive Director is hereby authorized to sign such an amendment on behalf of the Board. The motion was seconded by Ms. Swift. The motion carried by a vote of 3-2. Chair Lowman Smith, Ms. Motter, and Ms. Swift voted aye. Vice-Chair Jester and Mr. Lewis voted nay.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

Motion by Ms. Motter, seconded by Vice-Chair Jester, to move to executive session to discuss litigation. The motion carried unanimously.

Motion by Ms. Swift, seconded by Vice-Chair Jester, to resume the meeting. The motion carried unanimously. No votes were taken during the session.

BOARD COMMENTS

Chair Lowman Smith thanked the Director, the Law Department, and IT for allowing the Board to understand the situation and helping to find a solution that prioritized the protection of poll workers' information and the Department's ability to maintain its focus on preparing for early voting.

The Chair reiterated that this was an administrative system with no connection to voter data or election outcomes.

Vice Chair Jester expressed her disappointment with the outcome of the vote. She stated that in the comments she had heard, there was no confusion about the purpose of the system but that she wished a different tool had been chosen.

Mr. Lewis was also disappointed with the outcome of the vote. He stated that in the past the decision-making of the board had been balanced and that he feared that balance was wavering.

As a board member with Asian ancestry, Ms. Motter felt a public responsibility to speak up about the subtext surrounding the accusations against Konnech's CEO. She mentioned examples of discrimination against Asians both from history and her own experience. She expressed concern about the impact this conversation would have on the Asian community and stated that the allegations being made would need to be sorted out in court.

ADJOURNMENT

Motion by Ms. Swift, seconded by Ms. Motter, to adjourn the meeting. The motion carried unanimously. The meeting was adjourned at 2:50 p.m.

Chair Lowman Smith called the meeting to order at 4:30 p.m. Ms. Austin read the roll by calling each board member by name. All members were in attendance.

The board also received the following from Dr. Anna Ziering, who was unable to comment due to technical difficulties:

The burden of proof must be on the challengers—registering to vote is intimidating enough for so many of our young voters, and extra, unnecessary challenges are likely to make them give up. I would also ask that the BOE should also continue to do everything that they can to make VBM processing efficient and timely—processing ballots on Oct. 24, as allowed by GA law, will keep things running smoothly as votes continue to come in. The BOE's work is so important, particularly to facilitating and encouraging the participation of young citizens and new voters. Thanks again for your work to make voting accessible to us all.

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ITEMS FOR DISCUSSION

A) Director's Report

Director Smith highlighted some of the recent activities of the department. She announced the county had met its goal of maintaining 500,000 active registrations in order to continue deploying six absentee ballot drop boxes as it had in the past.

The Director presented a brief overview of Logic and Accuracy testing and announced that updates on the test results would be posted on the department's website every Monday.

The Director also presented statistics on absentee ballots and outreach efforts and an update on communications.

Mr. Lewis asked the Director to expand on a comment made about an outreach partnership with the ACLU. The Director responded that the effort had been expanded but was not new. The partnership focused on registering high school students and recruiting them to work at the polls.

Mr. Lewis asked if the events were organized by the ACLU or by the department. The Director responded that it was a coordinated effort.

Ms. Motter requested for the department to share its schedule for the Vote Review Panels as soon as possible. The Director responded that the schedule would be sent no later than Monday.

Ms. Motter asked for an update on advance voting times and locations for a potential December runoff. The Director responded that all November locations had been confirmed to return in December if necessary and that the times would be discussed at the November meeting.

Ms. Motter asked for the name of a Department contact for election day.

Ms. Motter also thanked the Director for the information the board had received regarding poll workers and training. She asked for an update poll worker recruitment. The Director responded that a sufficient number of poll workers had been recruited but that a reserve was still being accepted.

Ms. Swift asked for information about the vote by mail lead time; whether there was any registration processing left to do; and whether there were any plans in place to mitigate long lines during the first week of early voting. The Director responded that she would send mail lead statistics to the board; that there were less than 4,000 registration changes to process; and that the department felt it had an adequate staffing model for advance voting, but that additional staff would also be available for deployment if necessary.

Chair Lowman Smith asked when all registrations would be completed. The Director responded that the department would work through the weekend to process the applications currently in the queue, but that new applications would also arrive. Additional staff had been brought in to handle those applications.

B) Commissioner's Comments

Commissioner Mereda Davis Johnson was glad to hear of the department's efforts to ensure that people in DeKalb County would be able to vote. She encouraged people to exercise their right to vote.

ITEMS FOR DECISION

A) November Meeting

The Director recommended that the board's next meeting be held in person on November 15 no later than 1 p.m.

Motion by Vice-Chair Jester, seconded by Mr. Lewis, to that effect.

Chair Lowman Smith added that in person meetings could be live streamed but that it would not be possible for viewers to offer comments through the stream. It was being considered to allow the public to submit comments in writing which would be entered into the record.

The motion carried unanimously.

BOARD COMMENTS

Ms. Swift thanked the staff for their work preparing for the election and the board for working to ensure that voting was fair, transparent, and accessible.

Mr. Lewis thanked the staff and the public who made comments and hoped that they would be able to attend the next meeting in person.

Ms. Motter thanked the staff and the Director.

Vice-Chair Jester thanked the Director and looked forward to reading the L&A report. She stressed the importance of transparency, stating that everyone should receive information at roughly the same time and that all board deliberations should be done in public. She thanked the Board of Commissioners for its support.

Chair Lowman Smith thanked county partners at the County Attorney's office and the IT Department. She thanked the staff for its hard work behind the scenes.

ITEMS FOR DECISION

A) Probable cause determination on voter challenges under O.C.G.A. § 21-2-230

Ms. Vander Els informed the board of voter challenges brought by Stacy Altiery under O.C.G.A. § 21-2-230, similar in some ways to the Section 229 challenges heard previously. However, these

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challenges involved the right of the listed voters to participate in a specific election. She explained that the board's first task would be to determine whether probable cause had been met to schedule hearings for the challenged voters.

Motion by Ms. Swift, seconded by Mr. Lewis, to open discussion on the challenges.

Mr. Lewis asked if there had been PDF documents sent with the challenge. Ms. Vander Els responded that the links sent had included both spreadsheets and PDFs.

Mr. Lewis stated that the PDFs appeared to show registration in another state. He stated that in his opinion, this information provided probable cause to move forward with a hearing.

Ms. Swift asked Ms. Vander Els where the cited spreadsheet had come from. Ms. Vander Els responded that neither the spreadsheet nor the challenger's email cited a source.

Chair Lowman Smith asked how the recent list maintenance could interact with this challenge. Ms. Vander Els responded that the state's list maintenance procedure was the established way of comparing change of address information to voter registrations, with protections built in to Federal law.

Mr. Lewis asked when a hearing would need to be scheduled if it proved necessary. Ms. Vander Els responded that it would need to be as soon as possible ahead of election day, with at least three business days' notice to the challenger and challenged.

Motion by Ms. Swift, seconded by Ms. Motter, that the challenges failed due to lack of probable cause.

Mr. Lewis commented that the spreadsheet alone did not contain enough information, but that the PDFs appeared to indicate that the voters may have registered and voted in another state, which he believed provided probable cause to move forward with the hearing.

Ms. Motter explained to the public that the challenge contained information from a website called voteref.com, which she described as owned by a partisan political advocacy group. She noted that it had been alleged that the methods employed by the website were flawed and some cases illegal. She stated that under the circumstances she did not believe probable cause had been met.

Mr. Lewis stated that it would be necessary to hold a hearing to determine if the information provided was accurate.

The motion carried by a vote of 3-2. Chair Lowman Smith, Ms. Motter, and Ms. Swift voted aye. Vice-Chair Jester and Mr. Lewis voted nay.

BOARD COMMENTS

Chair Lowman Smith acknowledged the work done by the team in handling the high turnout of the election.

ADJOURNMENT

Motion by Ms. Motter, seconded by Mr. Lewis, to adjourn. The motion carried unanimously. The meeting was adjourned at 9:57 a.m.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA

Chair Lowman Smith called the meeting to order at 2:00 p.m. Ms. Austin read the roll by calling each board member by name. All members were in attendance.

Motion by Ms. Motter, seconded by Vice-Chair Jester, to approve the agenda. The motion carried unanimously.

Ms. Austin read the rules for public comment:

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ITEMS FOR DECISION

A) Probable Cause Determination for Voter Challenges Brought by Gail Lee

Ms. Vander Els explained that Gail Lee had challenged the right of forty-three voters to vote by absentee ballot due to being in inactive status. The board's next step would be to determine if probable cause existed to schedule hearings for the affected voters.

Motion by Ms. Motter, seconded by Ms. Swift, that the challenges failed to show probable cause.

Ms. Motter noted the importance of federal law to these challenges, as with others heard recently by the board. She stated that despite a perceived lack of clarity in the statute's language, guidance from the state made it clear that it was not the law's intent to make a second class out of inactive voters. Ms. Motter stated that due to the importance of the right to vote, any unclear language needed to be construed in favor of keeping voters on the rolls.

Vice-Chair Jester asked if the board was here to deal with the challenges themselves. Ms. Vander Els responded that the board was determining only whether probable cause existed to schedule a hearing. Vice-Chair Jester asked what the standard for probable cause in this case was. Ms. Vander Els read the definition given by a court case, requiring reasonable grounds with more than mere suspicion but not requiring convincing proof.

Vice-Chair Jester asked everyone concerned to refrain from any hostility to the challengers.

Ms. Swift referred to the challenge letter's statement that inactive voters could only return to active status by signing an affidavit affirming their address. She noted that the absentee ballot application contained such an affidavit, as well as requiring the voter to provide ID. She stated that in her view there was not a basis in fact or law that would allow the challenge to move forward.

Mr. Lewis asked to make clear that the challenges were not to remove voters from the rolls entirely.

Mr. Lewis asked how many of the challenged voters had voted in person and how many voters had returned ballots by mail. Director Smith responded that one had voted in person so far and twenty-nine had returned ballots by mail.

Mr. Lewis asked if the challenge affected the voters' ability to vote in person. Ms. Vander Els responded that it did not.

Mr. Lewis stated that it was the right of DeKalb residents to bring these challenges and that he always found them educational. He did not believe that the challenges were an effort to create a second class of voters.

Ms. Swift stated that the absentee process as it exists already accounts for the concerns raised in the letter by requiring identification from the voter and a signed affirmation of the voter's address.

Chair Lowman Smith asked what the next steps would be if probable cause were found. Ms. Vander Els responded that the staff would immediately notify the challenged voters and the challenger and then schedule hearings prior to certification.

The motion carried by a vote of 3-2. Chair Lowman Smith, Ms. Motter, and Ms. Swift voted aye. Vice-Chair Jester and Mr. Lewis voted nay.

B) Advance Voting Polling Hours

Director Smith informed the board that a press release had mistakenly informed the public that the polls would be open until 6:00 p.m. on Sunday, October 30. To avoid inconveniencing voters, the polls had initially been allowed to remain open past 5:00 p.m. However, after consultation with the Law Department and the Secretary of State's office, the sites had been told to close prior to 6:00. The Director asked the board to ratify the extension of hours.

Vice-Chair Jester asked how many people had voted during the extended time. The Director responded that 104 voters countywide had checked in after 5:00 p.m. Some of those had arrived in the polling place before 5:00 and would therefore have been eligible to vote anyway. Approximately 88 had arrived after 5:00 and were allowed to vote.

Ms. Motter emphasized for the public that the Law Department and the Secretary of State had been consulted in this matter. She asked what steps would be taken to prevent similar errors in the future. The Director responded that press releases would be reviewed by more than one person before dissemination.

Motion by Vice-Chair Jester, seconded by Mr. Lewis, to ratify the extended hours in question. The motion carried unanimously.

BOARD COMMENTS

Chair Lowman Smith yielded the floor to Commissioner Mereda Davis Johnson, who thanked the department for supporting the record turnout in this election.

Vice-Chair Jester thanked Commissioner Davis Johnson, Mr. Matelski, the Law Department, and the voters.

Ms. Motter congratulated the Director and the staff for a successful early voting period.

Mr. Lewis thanked the staff at the early voting locations for the great job they were doing and the hours they worked. He also thanked the staff for responding to his questions. He stated that despite what some had said, past boards had taken challenges seriously. He asked the board not to cede responsibility for maintaining the voter rolls to the state.

Chair Lowman Smith commented on the record-breaking numbers seen in the election and agreed with Mr. Lewis that the wait times had been well-managed.

The Chair offered an overview of the challenges recently brought before the board and cited three examples of voters in other counties who had been improperly disenfranchised due to similar challenges. She stated her pride in protecting the rights of voters.

ADJOURNMENT

Motion by Vice-Chair Jester, seconded by Mr. Lewis, to adjourn. The meeting was adjourned at 3:01 p.m.

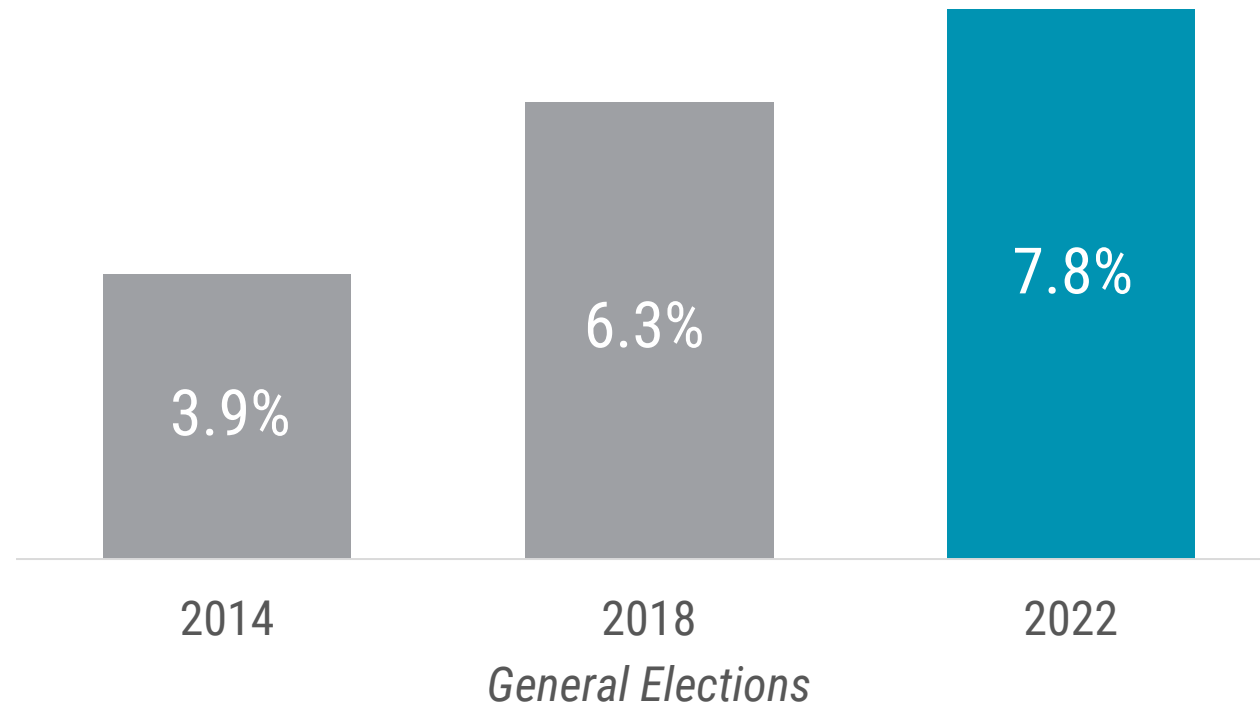
